



Greetings to Soldiers, Family Members and Friends of the I Strike Battalion,

The summer is rapidly approaching! It is becoming hotter and hotter as each day passes, and the I Strike Battalion is preparing for the summer onslaught by stocking water, refrigerators, and air conditioning units. Truth be told, we will probably be cooler here than all of you back in Germany. Don't worry about your soldiers; they have plenty of ways to stay cool over the next few months.

One of the best ways for them to beat the heat is the Fighter Management Pass Program (FMPP), which has begun with a great measure of success. FMPP allows soldiers to spend four days off at a resort in Qatar in the Persian Gulf, or at a hotel in the cool Iraqi Mountains to the north. A number of I Strike soldiers have already taken advantage of this program and the feedback has been very positive. In Qatar, our soldiers spent their time deep-sea fishing, dining at Chili's, or site-seeing at American-style shopping malls. Up in the mountains, the hotel is situated alongside the crystal waters of a high-altitude lake and traditional food is available as well as opportunities for bike riding, hiking, and just relaxing among the sylvan scenery. We will continue to expand and offer FMPP as the deployment continues.

The Rest & Recuperation (R&R) program has gotten off to a rockier start, unfortunately. As of June 15th, we were only able to send 9 soldiers on 2-week leave, but we are hoping for a pickup next month and will do our best to keep you informed on the status of this very important program. Contrary to what may have been heard, R&R has not been cancelled. This is one of our top priorities as a battalion and I will do everything in my power to increase the opportunities for our soldiers to take advantage of some much-needed time with their families.

I Strike Soldiers are continuing to set the standard for the Division and are representing themselves in such prestigious events as the Memorial Day Color Guard Ceremony. PFC Darnell Reed will be the standard-bearer for the battalion in the Big Red One Color Guard. The battalion will also be well-represented during the Division's Combat Patch Ceremony on June 6th, the anniversary of D-Day, and as the organizing unit of the FOB Memorial Day Remembrance Ceremony.

The I Strike Battalion has made quite a name for itself across the whole Division Sector as we have Early Warning soldiers stationed at various FOBs. I visited all of them recently and witnessed first-hand how well they are being treated by their host units and can say that their living conditions are very nice, with some enjoying the comfort and privacy of their own housing units. I would like to take this opportunity to commend their supervisors, SSG Goodman, SGT Tran, SGT Stansfield, and SGT Perches for looking out for their soldiers' well-being and ensuring that the standards of Physical, Mental, and Spiritual Fitness are all maintained.

Thank you all for continuing to provide feedback to us about our website www.4-3adairaq.com as we continue to update it in an effort to demonstrate the accomplishments of the battalion. Our families are in our hearts and prayers always. Please keep us in yours.

We are currently preparing for the transfer of authority to the Iraqi people. We are all looking forward to this event. 


SSG Francis





On June 6, 1944, the soldiers of the 1st Infantry Division stormed Omaha Beach at Normandy as part of the largest forcible entry operation in history. The 1st Infantry Division was already a combat-hardened unit, having proven themselves in the deserts of Africa and the mountains of Sicily. By the time of D-Day, they had eleven months of hard fighting ahead of them before their mission was accomplished.

This year on June 6, we'll commemorate the history of the Big Red One by writing another chapter. At 0900 each soldier in Bravo Battery and the I Strike Battalion will be awarded the Combat Patch, officially known as the Distinctive Unit Symbol for Wartime Service. For most soldiers, this is their first time serving in a combat zone. Although our mission ends after twelve months, this is not the last time 1st Infantry Division Soldiers will march in the sands and marshes of a hostile land.

If you have the opportunity, visit the 1st Infantry Division Museum in Würzburg on June 6th. Remember the service of those who have gone before us, as well as the service of the current incarnation of the Big Red One. Your support and love means the world to the men of the Black Lion Battery.



He will be sorely missed by his Renegade family, the Delta Dawgs, and every soldier who was fortunate enough to come in contact with him. PFC Johnson made the ultimate sacrifice on June 1, 2004 during a combat patrol in Tikrit, Iraq. Over 250 fellow soldiers and friends attended a memorial ceremony in his honor at FOB Danger on June 4, 2004.
