## HOME OF THE 1ST INFANTRY DIVISION THE BIG RED ONE

- 1 A five-brigade installation
  - 1 A mix of Armor, Infantry, Aviation and Combat Support capabilities
  - 1 Oversight of units at Ft. Knox, Ft. Sill, and Ft. Leonard Wood
  
- 1 Soldier and Family populations have nearly doubled since 2005
  - 1 ~ 18,000 Soldiers
  - 1 ~ 24,750 Family Members
  - 1 ~ 7,800 Civilian workers
  
- 1 Children in on- and off-post schools now number approximately 7,500
  
- 1 The greater Ft. Riley population is ~55,000
  - 1 Military, family members, retirees, civilian employees, and contractors



## FORT RILEY'S ECONOMIC IMPACT ON THE CENTRAL FLINT HILLS REGION

**TOTAL DIRECT ECONOMIC IMPACT IN FISCAL YEAR 2011 WAS \$1,915,170,000**

- 1 \$1.29 Billion in Payroll
- 1 \$313 Million in Supplies, Services and Contracts
- 1 \$185 Million in Construction
- 1 \$68.1 Million in Outsourced Patient Care (Medical and Dental)



**\$8.83 million in estimated Net Public Benefit (sum of all taxes Soldiers and Civilians pay)**

## INFRASTRUCTURE INTEGRITY

\$1.6 Billion in military construction since 2005

- Brigade and Battalion headquarters, Company Operations Facilities
- ~ 6,300 barracks spaces meeting the Army's "1+1" standard
- Soldier and Family facilities

Housing

- 1,090 new homes constructed
- 1,071 homes renovated
- 1,027 homes remaining to be built to reach the 3,827 endstate

Hospital

- Occupancy in 2014
- 68 beds, 2 obstetrics operating rooms, 7 oral surgery rooms
- New MRI, sleep lab, and inpatient behavioral health capability

Schools

- Five of six are National Blue Ribbon or Governor's Award of Excellence winners
- New Elementary School under construction
- Replacement Middle School funded; additional Elementary Schools under consideration

## MODERNIZATION

- 1 The Army's most modern Division
  - 1 M1A2 System Enhancement Program (SEP) Tank
  - 1 Bradley Fighting Vehicle A3
  - 1 AH-64D Apache Block III
  - 1 MQ-1 Gray Eagle Unmanned Aviation System (pending fielding)
- 1 State of the Art Simulations
  - 1 Linked to Ft. Leavenworth, Smoky Hill, and Ft. Sill
- 1 New and modernized ranges and training facilities
- 1 A training platform for others
  - 1 20,000+ Reserve, National Guard, and ROTC service members train annually
  - 1 Air Force uses Fort Riley airfield for training

## SUSTAINABILITY

- 1 Selected as a Net Zero Water Pilot Installation
  - 1 Partnering with EPA / Water balance study completed
  - 1 Native prairie areas save millions of gallons of water per year
- 1 Low Energy Cost
  - 1 Cost per kilowatt hour is below U.S. Army average
  - 1 Low energy cost per building square footage
- 1 4 Gold and 24 Silver LEED Certified buildings
  - 1 LEED = Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design
  - 1 Numerous other buildings constructed to LEED or similar standards
- 1 Evaluating potential Third-Party Financing opportunities for energy monitoring and waste water management
- 1 Exploring Public-Private Ventures



## ENCROACHMENT

- 1 No significant encroachment issues
- 1 Programs and processes are in place to prevent encroachment
  - 1 Army Compatible Use Buffer (ACUB) Program provides funding to purchase Conservation Easements
  - 1 Communication and cooperation with local communities and state officials codified through Kansas Statute (12 KSA 772-775)
  - 1 Excellent land management programs on post protect endangered and at-risk species
- 1 Continued cooperation will be necessary

- 1 Institute for Health and Security of Military Families for research and counseling on impacts of deployment on military families




### 1 Working closely with the State Attorney General
